THIS THEORY ALIGNS WITH THE OBSERVATION THAT MANY SPECIES EXHIBIT SLEEP PATTERNS THAT CORRESPOND TO THEIR ECOLOGICAL NICHES, INDICATING AN EVOLUTIONARY ADAPTATION TO ENVIRONMENTAL RISKS.

SOCIAL INTERACTION THEORY

SOCIAL INTERACTION THEORY POSITS THAT SLEEP HAS EVOLVED TO PROMOTE SOCIAL BONDING AND COHESION WITHIN GROUPS. EACH STAGE SERVES DISTINCT FUNCTIONS, FROM LIGHT REST TO DEEP RESTORATION. SLOW-WAVE SLEEP, IN PARTICULAR, IS CRITICAL FOR PHYSICAL RECOVERY AND MEMORY CONSOLIDATION.

REM SLEEP

REM SLEEP, CHARACTERIZED BY RAPID EYE MOVEMENTS AND INCREASED BRAIN ACTIVITY, IS VITAL FOR EMOTIONAL REGULATION AND MEMORY PROCESSING. IT TYPICALLY OCCURS ABOUT 90 MINUTES AFTER FALLING ASLEEP AND IS ASSOCIATED WITH VIVID DREAMING. CIRCADIAN RHYTHMS AND SLEEP
